

# HELPING AFGHAN FAMILIES START OVER IN WISCONSIN

In August, we learned that refugees from Afghanistan were being relocated to Wisconsin's Fort McCoy.

The Ho-Chunk Nation was coordinating a donation drive to provide Afghan families with essential items for their new lives in Wisconsin. Fort McCoy sits on Ho-Chunk traditional territory and they wanted to welcome Afghan families and their allies to their homeland.

Madison College recognizes and respects the Ho-Chunk Nation as a community partner. In this spirit, we reached out and agreed to join forces in gathering donations for the refugee families.

We collected items at all regional and metro campuses for three weeks. This led up to our September 17 drive-thru event at Truax Campus. People donated clothing, footwear, personal hygiene products, backpacks, luggage and baby items.

About 35 volunteers made the drive-thru event a success. People from across the college directed traffic, unloaded vehicles, sorted and packed items. That day alone generated 14 pallets of donated goods. This was enough to fill our facilities truck three times.

Roughly 115 vehicles came through with donation items.

We then committed ourselves to sorting all of the items so they could be given to families more quickly.

Not only did we see our faculty, staff, and students give time and materials to the donation drive, we made connections with community organizations across the district. We were all connected by a desire to help.

I'm proud of this effort because it allowed us to strengthen our relationship with our partners and put the mission of our college—meeting the evolving needs of our diverse communities—into further action.

COVID-19 and its variants have caused a nationwide nursing shortage. During the peak of the omicron variant surge, hospitals were having to turn away patients and cancel elective procedures.

In January, Governor Tony Evers announced nearly 100 members of the Wisconsin National Guard would receive certified nursing assistant training at Madison College.

The projected staffing relief was expected to allow skilled nursing facilities to open up roughly 200 more beds by the end of February.

Dr. Lisa Greenwood, Associate Dean of Nursing says, "Our healthcare providers are beyond exhausted. This historic partnership between Madison College and the National Guard is critical in providing Wisconsin communities and the healthcare industry the help they desperately need in the fight against COVID-19."

The Guard members arrived on campus and dove into their training. Over two intense weeks, they earned their digital badges. This hands-on education will provide a ripple effect of relief in the months ahead.

Approximately 230 Wisconsin National Guard members are working in healthcare facilities throughout Wisconsin.

This collaboration has shone a spotlight on Wisconsin and on Madison College. Local, regional and national news outlets have shared this story on a grander scale. This is proof that the innovative and generous spirit of Madison College is a force for good in our community and beyond.

# ALUMNUS OUSMANE KABRE CREATES FUTURE LEADERS OF CHANGE

Madison College Business Management alumnus, Ousmane Kabre, started his journey from West Africa. He came to the United States to learn English and find opportunity.

At Madison College, Ousmane put in that determination and effort, earning himself prestige as a Student Senate President, a Wisconsin Technical College State Ambassador, and by earning the Karen Roberts Student Life Leadership Award. Ousmane also earned a seat at the Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society and was awarded the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship.

With a list of accomplishments like that, it's without wonder that Ousmane Kabre would now earn the Wisconsin Technical College System's 2021 Distinguished Alumni of the Year award, presented by the District Boards Association.

Provost Turina Bakken shared, "In my 25 years at Madison College, I have had the honor of working with many outstanding students—students who have modeled the ideals of the WTCS with integrity, work ethic and great success. Yet there is one who simply rises above all, in character, in occupational and educational success, in serving our communities and quite literally in changing our world. That is Ousmane."

Ousmane doesn't intend to stop there. He earned a Master of Accountancy from UW-Madison. This gave him the foundation for his career in finance. It also led him to a way to show people of his home country their own potential: he started the nonprofit organization, Leading Change.

His Leading Change dream is to transform more than 1,000 young Africans into leaders by the year 2030. Ousmane plans to make that dream happen by jump-starting the road to success for 24 Leading Change Scholars journeying from West Africa to Wisconsin.

For those aspiring scholars, Leading Change opened an educational center in Africa, opening its doors for those taking their first steps of success. Just like Ousmane, some of those scholars will begin their journey here at Madison College.

# COLLEGE ERASES MILLIONS IN STUDENT DEBT



Students were elated to find out they could return to school

"Thank you!"

"Bless you!"

Students exclaimed these phrases to me multiple times in the summer of 2021.

Last April, our Financial Wellness team did a preliminary outreach to students to see what barriers stopped them from re-enrolling at Madison College to finish their education.

Students had several reasons in common for being unable to re-enroll. Many could not pay their outstanding balances.

A considerable number had lost income due to reduced work hours or closed workplaces. Some had been forced to start supporting parents and siblings. So many faced stress-related health issues and difficulty adjusting to online learning—their own and their children's.

And of course, many were grieving family members who passed away unexpectedly from COVID.

### "What a joy to be able to share some good news with these students."

Our team followed up with them at the end of June to let them know that their outstanding tuition balances would be forgiven through the American Rescue Plan Act at Madison College.

The students' responses ranged from excited to happy to grateful! One said she had been paying little by little to get back into school. Now the debt forgiveness would get their plans back on track.

Another screamed in my ear, "This means I can go back to school!"

In total, we erased \$4 million of debt for students who attended between spring 2020 and spring 2021.

# WISCONSIN INNOVATION GRANT WILL HELP WORKING FAMILIES

December yielded a gift for Madison College and the community.

During his December 16 visit to Truax Campus, Governor Tony Evers announced the college would receive up to \$2.9 million to develop in-demand skills training in childcare, advanced manufacturing, health care and information technology.

Madison College is among a dozen regional projects that will receive a total of nearly \$60 million in Workforce Innovation Grants to develop long-term solutions to the state's workforce challenges.

The projects will be funded through the federal American Rescue Plan Act. A second round of grants will be awarded in 2022.

"These investments will make a big difference for our workers, families and communities, and the long-term success of our state."

"Wisconsin has one of the lowest unemployment rates in the country and we have high labor participation, but our state faces long-standing workforce challenges that existed for years before the pandemic," said Gov. Evers. "These investments will make a big difference for our workers, families and communities, and the long-term success of our state."

President Daniels added, "We know working families often face barriers to accessing higher education and the higher earnings that result from advanced training or a college degree. Access to high-quality childcare and family-sustaining wages are critical to eliminating barriers to accessing higher education and supporting the success of all in our diverse communities."

On February 1, Goodman South Campus hosted a roundtable discussion to begin deciding how to allocate the funds. Madison College stakeholders were joined by leaders from the state Department of Administration, Wisconsin Department of Children and Families and the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development.

# IT'S NEVER TOO LATE FOR A NEW BEGINNING

Charles Satterfield has worked as a night shift custodian at Madison College for about five years. In May 2021, at age 67, Charles earned his GED. His story garnered extensive local media coverage, inspiring others to start over at Madison College.

### Q: You got your GED at age 67. What made you decide to come to Madison College to complete it after all these years?

As a custodian on campus, I used to see how hard the students were working. I thought, "I could do that. I could get my GED. And maybe, just maybe I can be a reflection on my grandkids and my children. Maybe I can motivate them to go to school." It looks like in some ways that's paid off because my daughter is pursuing nursing and my grandson—he's only six—but I can see he's more motivated about school. He sees me going to classes and that's made him more excited about school.

#### Q: How did it feel to earn your GED?

It felt good. But honestly, my biggest accomplishment is becoming drug-free. I took some turns in life and my family is still what matters most.

When I got cleaned up, I did it for my kids. I honestly never thought about going back to school until I started working here. I saw the students, how hard they were working. But it also looked like fun!

And if I got my GED, I knew I'd make my mom proud. She's almost 90 and lives in Texas. My family sent her a tape of my graduation and it made her so happy.

I want to be an addiction counselor and help other people who are in recovery. Maybe I can help somebody. That's my goal.

It got me to go to school. Seeing the students working so hard really got to me. And the staff here —I could go on and on about how wonderful the instructors are.

Any time it got difficult and I thought about quitting my classes, my instructors talked to me and kept me going. They never gave up on me, so I never gave up on myself. That was pretty cool.


#### January 13, 2022: Embrace Your Identity Fashion Show


